## STEVE NICOL HEAD COACH

ntering his sixth season at the helm of the Revolution in 2007, Steve Nicol was named head coach of the team on November 6, 2002, after serving as the interim head coach for the final 21 games of the 2002 regular season and the postseason. In each of his five seasons at the helm of the Revolution, Nicol has guided the club to the MLS Eastern Conference Championship game, and has three times led the team to MLS Cup (2002, 2005 & 2006), including each of the last two seasons. The Revs are one of just two MLS clubs to ever return to MLS Cup in back-to-back season.

Nicol's hiring marked yet another impressive accomplishment in the Scotland native's distinguished career. During his playing days Nicol, 44, gained worldwide fame while playing for Liverpool in England's top division before moving on to play for Notts County, West Bromwich Albion, Sheffield Wednesday and Doncaster Rovers.

Nicol, who was born in the Scottish town of Troon, began his pro career at the age of 18 with Ayr United before being signed by Liverpool in 1981. The £300,000 transfer fee remains the Ayr United club record.

While with Liverpool, Nicol made 467 appearances as a defender and midfielder and scored 46 goals. He was at the heart of a Liverpool side that won four English League Titles, three F.A. Cup Titles and the 1984 European Cup. In 1989, his importance to the team was honored when Britain's soccer writers named him Footballer of the Year. Between 1984 and

1992 Nicol appeared 27 times for the Scottish National Team, and started for his country at the 1986 World Cup in Mexico.

Nicol's coaching career began in 1995 when he was named player/manager at Notts County. Four years later, he arrived in New England as a player/assistant coach with the Boston Bulldogs. In September of that year, he joined the Revs as interim coach for the final two games of the season, both of which were Revolution wins. He returned to the Bulldogs as a player/coach for the 2000 and 2001 season before re-joining the Revs as an assistant coach prior to the 2002 campaign.

Nicol was named the 2002 MLS Coach of the Year after leading the Revolution within a goal of the MLS Cup. In 2003 and 2004, he led the Revs to within an extra time goal and a penalty kick shootout, respectively, of making the league final. He coached the Revs to his second MLS Cup final in 2005, after winning the Eastern Conference Championship with New England for a second time.

Nicol was also honored for his coaching excellence in August 2005, when he was chosen to lead the MLS Select XI against Real Madrid at the Santiago Bernabeau Stadium.

Nicol holds a USSF "A" coaching licence.

In addition to his coaching duties, Nicol is also a guest analyst for ESPN International.

Nicol resides in Hopkinton, Mass., with his wife, Eleanor, and the couple have two children, Michael and Katy.

## MARINER ASSISTANT COACH

aul Mariner enters his fourth season as Steve Nicol's top assistant coach in 2007. He has helped lead the Revolution to three straight MLS Eastern Conference Championship games, as well as MLS Cup 2005 and MLS Cup 2006.

Born in Bolton, Lancashire, England, Mariner is remembered by world soccer fans as one of the top center forwards in English football in the late 1970s and early 1980s. He earned 35 international caps playing for his country, and led the England attack in the 1982 FIFA World Cup. He is the coholder for the England National Team record for goal scoring in consecutive games (6).

After starting his professional club career with Plymouth Argyle, Mariner scored 97 goals in eight seasons for Ipswich Town from 1976-84, before playing three seasons with Arsenal FC in London and finishing his English Leagues career with Portsmouth

Mariner's many honors as a player include winning the 1978 FA Cup Final with Ipswich Town, a game in which he was named Man of the Match despite not being the goal scorer, in the memorable 1-0 classic win over Arsenal. He was also a key member of the 1981 UEFA Cup-winning Ipswich Town team. He scored for England against France in the 1982 World Cup, and also scored in a qualifying match against Hungary on Nov. 18, 1981, a 1-0 victory at Wembley Stadium that put England through to the 1982 World Cup.

Mariner came to the United States in 1988 to coach the Albany Capitals of the APSL, followed by a stint with the league's San Francisco Bay Blackhawks. Before joining the Revolution, Mariner was an assistant to former Revs forward and current Harvard University head men's soccer coach John Kerr, Jr. Mariner has also served as Technical Director for the FC Greater Boston Bolts, one of the top youth soccer clubs in the U.S.

Mariner has worked as a color commentator on BBC North West broadcasts of the English Premier League and as a World Cup analyst on New Zealand television and ESPN International.

Mariner and his wife, Dee, live outside of Boston.



#### GWYNNE WILLIAMS ASSISTANT COACH

wynne Williams is in his first season as the goalkeepers coach for the New England Revolution. He joined the Revolution coaching staff in February 2007 after 11 seasons on the staff of NCAA Division II soccer powerhouse Lynn University in Boca Raton, Fla.

An NSCAA National Goalkeeping Instructor, Williams is a member of the USSF National Coaching Staff and holds a USSF "A" coaching license.

A native of St. Helens, England, Williams has been on the coaching advisory councils of the Canadian Soccer Association and Bermuda Football Association.

Williams earned his certificate of education from Nonington College of Physical Education in 1975, and completed his bachelor of education degree at London University in 1976.



## BANFILL EQUIPMENT MANAGER

Brian Banfill is in his second season as the equipment manager of the New England Revolution. Banfill's responsibilities include organizing and maintaining the team's uniforms, practice gear and equipment, and overseeing the gameday equipment staff that assists in both the Revs' and visitors' locker rooms and on the field. He also works closely with the technical staff on setting up and equipping training sessions both at home and on the road.

Banfill joined the organization as the Revs' equipment manager on Nov. 28, 2005 after three seasons working with the team's volunteer gameday staff, the Revs Brigade. He contributed in many areas during this time, also working in the popular Soccer Celebration pregame interactive entertainment area before joining the gameday staff where he worked both the home and visitors' locker rooms.

Prior to joining the Revolution, Banfill worked for eight years in the sporting goods retail industry. He is an avid ice hockey fan and participates in several recreational leagues in his spare time.

Banfill lives in central Massachusetts with his wife, Melissa, and their son, Kyle.





# BERTRAM ZARINS M.D. HEAD TEAM PHYSICIAN

r. Bertram Zarins has been the New England Revolution's head team physician since the team's inception in 1996. He is Associate Clinical Professor of Orthopaedic Surgery at Harvard Medical School and Chief of the Sports Medicine Service at the Massachusetts General Hospital.

Zarins also has been team physician for the New England Patriots since 1982 and the Boston Bruins since 1976. He served on the U.S. Olympic Committee Sports Medicine Council for 12 years and was Head Physician for the XIV Winter Olympics in Sarajevo in 1984.

Dr. Zarins is an orthopedic surgeon and specializes in the treatment of athletic injuries. He is an expert on the knee and shoulder, especially injuries such as torn anterior cruciate ligament (ACL), torn meniscus (knee cartilage), shoulder instability and torn rotator cuff.

Zarins received his M.D. degree from the State University of New York, Upstate Medical Center in Syracuse in 1967. He later completed an internship and assistant residency program in general surgery at the Johns Hopkins Hospital in Baltimore. Additionally, Zarins completed the Harvard Combined Orthopedic Residency Program in 1973, before serving as Chief of Orthopedics at the US Naval Regional Medical Center in Guam for two years. Following his military service, Zarins completed a fellowship in Sports Medicine with Dr. Carter Rowe and the Edward F. Cave Travelling Fellowship in 1976.

Zarins is a former Chairman of the American Academy of Orthopedic Surgeons Committee on Sports Medicine, and is a member of the AAOS Committee on Arthroscopy Education. He has also served on the Board of Directors of the International Arthroscopy Association and has been active in the Arthroscopy Association of North America, American Orthopaedic Society for Sports Medicine and other professional organizations including the FDA.

Recognized worldwide for his medical knowledge, Zarins has been president of the Latvian Medical and Dental Association and is a foreign member of the Latvian Academy of Science. Dr. Zarins is Honorary President of the Spain Arthroscopy Association. Zarins received the Distinguished Alumnus Award from Syracuse Health Sciences Center in 1997 and has been on the editorial boards of several medical journals. He is currently a Consulting Editor for Sports Medicine for the Journal of Bone and Joint Surgery.



# PENNIMAN HEAD ATHLETIC TRAINER

Ayne Penniman, P.T., A.T.C., CSCS, is in his first season with the Revolution as the team's head athletic trainer. In addition to being a certified athletic trainer, Penniman is also a registered physical therapist and certified strength and conditioning specialist.

Penniman comes to the Revs from the Bancroft School in Worcester, Mass., where he was the head athletic trainer since 2006, and the Clinton Irish Blizzard of the Eastern Football League, where he has had two stints as the head athletic trainer. Prior to his work at the Bancroft School, Penniman was the Director of Athletic Training Services at Nashoba Valley Medical Center in Ayer, Mass., a staff physical therapist at South County Physical Therapy, and a senior physical therapist at Spaulding Neighborhood Rehabilitation Center in Wellesley, Mass.

He has completed work toward his master's degree in post-professional physical therapy at Oakland University - where he was the head trainer for the men's soccer and base-ball teams during the 2002-03 academic year - and expects to earn his masters during the 2007 Revs season.

A fitness expert, Penniman also likes to ride motorcycles and work around his house in his spare time. Penniman, a native of Maynard, Mass., now lives in the suburbs west of Boston with his wife, Leigh.

How Acquired: Selected by the Revolution in the sixth round (56th overall) of the 2004 MLS SuperDraft

Dorman enjoyed a breakout campaign in 2006, establishing himself as one of the league's top midfielders ... a true student of the game, he displayed the ability to thrive at several different midfield slots in Steve Nicol's starting team, including stints as the wide right, attacking and holding midfielder ... demonstrates an exemplary work rate ... Soccer America named Dorman the third-best attacking midfielder in MLS for 2006.

2006: Established new career highs and was voted the Midnight Riders' Man of the Year in his best professional season to date. Recorded six goals and a team-high 10 assists both totals that surpassed his career totals entering the season - while starting all 32 games and playing every midfield position. His 10 assists were the second-highest total in MLS behind five players with 11. Played a career-high 2,834 minutes to rank sixth in MLS. Was also ranked fifth in the league in shots on goal (33). Had three game-winning assists and three times scored game-tying goals: vs. Chivas USA on May 13, at Chicago on June 11 and vs. D.C. on June 17. Started all four of the Revs' MLS Cup Playoffs matches, and assisted on Taylor Twellman's goal against Chicago in the second game of the Eastern Conference Semifinal.

2005: Increased his playing time five-fold from his rookie campaign, starting 19 games and appearing in a total of 30 regular season matches. Equaled goals output from 2004 with two and registered five assists. Became the Revs' go-to corner kick taker when José Cancela was not on the field.

2004: Dorman bided his time as a squad player before establishing himself as a "super sub" in the latter part of the campaign when 18 of Dorman's 20 regular season appearances were as a sub. Finished seventh on the team in scoring (two goals, one assists, five points) despite playing just 365 minutes.

COLLEGE: Was a four-year player at Boston University (2000-03) ... was a three-time All-New England and three-time all-conference honoree ... left the program holding the career assist record (37), and ranked fourth in the category as a senior with a 0.71 assists per game mark ... his 13 assists as a junior ranked second in school history for single-season production ... concluded his collegiate career ranked seventh in school history in overall scoring with 81 points (22 goals, 37 assists).

How Acquired: Selected by the Revolution with the second selection in the 2000 MLS Special Draft from Los Angeles.

Has been a team leader since arriving in New England during the 2000 season... is the longest-tenured member of the Revolution, joining the club in 2000... leads by example both on and off the field, displaying an unparalleled work ethic and consistency... a dead-ball specialist with his left foot, Franchino is also a very good crosser of the ball in open play... will feature at left-sided midfield, left back and in the central midfield... enters 2007 tied with Jay Heaps for the club's career starts record with 155... earlier in 2006, Franchino set the team's appearances and minutes played records, before Heaps assumed the lead in both categories... is one of five players who have started each of the Revolution's three MLS Cup appearances (2002, 2005, 2006), and has made four total trips to the league's championship game, including a trip with Los Angeles in 1999.

2006: Appeared in 21 games after suffering pair of injuries (hamstring strain and ankle sprain) that caused him to miss 10 games. Set all three of New England's club longevity records and briefly held the Revs' career records in appearances, starts and minutes played during the 2006 season. Started all four playoff games in the midfield. Saw time at left back, left wing and central midfield during the season. Recorded his only assist of the season on Clint Dempsey's game-tying goal against D.C. on Sept. 13 at Gillette Stadium.

2005: Again wore the captain's armband for coach Steve Nicol whenever on the field. Recorded three assists, the fifth time in his career he reached that mark. Tallied assists in back-to-back games in September (Sept. 10 vs. Columbus and Sept. 17 at New York.). Started all four of the Revs' postseason games as New England made its second appearance in MLS

2004: Once again served as Revolution club captain. Injuries limited Franchino to 20 regular-season games and kept him out of playoff action. Had arthroscopic surgeries on his left knee and also his partially detached gluteus medius (hip) muscle on Oct.15. Scored his only goal of the season on May 1 against his former team, the Los Angeles Galaxy. Made his 100th appearance and 100th start as member of the Revolution on May 22, 2004 against the MetroStars.

2003: A steadying presence on the left side of the defense, starting 25 games, while collecting a goal and four assists. The lone goal was the game-winner in overtime of the Revs' 3-2 win over Columbus on Sept. 28. A late season calf injury stopped him from setting personal single-season highs in minutes played. Tallied new personal bests in shots (25) and shots on goal (8) as the Revs returned to the Eastern Conference Final.

2002: In his first full season with the club, finished third on the team in scoring with 10 points while playing in 27 of the Revs' 28 games, primarily at right back. 

Joseph is the whole package in the defensive midfield ... as tenacious a ball-winner and tackler as there is in MLS ... Joseph's superior passing touch and good decision making means that he is the trigger-point for the Revs' build-up play ... rarely loses an aerial duel ... a vocal leader and communicator on the field ... Soccer America named Joseph the top holding midfielder in MLS for 2006 ... a talismanic presence on the field and in the locker room ... one of the team's first-choice penalty-kick takers.

2006: An MLS All-Star "First XI" selection, but was unable to play in the league's all-star match against EPL champion Chelsea FC because of the Revs' rescheduled game at Chivas USA. Voted Revolution Best Defender by the New England soccer media. Scored three goals and added one assist while controlling the Revs' midfield. Notched two goals on May 6 in the Revs' 4-0 victory over Los Angeles at Gillette Stadium. Missed the final five games of the regular season after undergoing surgery to repair torn ligaments and nerves in his right hand, but returned to start the three postseason games for which he was available. Played all 120 minutes of MLS Cup 2006, converting his shot in the game-deciding penalty kicks.

2005: Elected to the league Best XI and All-Star teams and voted Revolution team Most Valuable Player by the New England soccer media. Considered by most observers to have been the MLS Select team's best player in the Trofeo Santiago Bernabeau match at Real Madrid on August 23. Added six goals to his usual tough-tackling, accurate-passing brand of play, Recorded his first-career two-qoal game against

the MetroStars at Giants Stadium on Sept. 17, also adding an assist in that game.

2004: In his sophomore season in MLS, Joseph staked a claim to being the premier contention midfielder in the league. Started and played in 23 regular season matches and all three Revs playoffs games, registering three regular-season assists. Missed two games in June to play in World Cup qualifying with Grenada. Also missed action because of a broken nose (two games) and a hip flexor/quadriceps injury (three games). Accumulated just four regular season yellow cards despite playing an aggressive style, a testament to his good timing and tackling technique. Was a 2004 Sierra Mist MLS All-Star.

2003: Joseph became a force in central midfield during his rookie year with the Revolution, appearing in 28 games and finishing second on the club in minutes played with 2,466. Made his MLS debut on April 19 against Columbus at Gillette Stadium when he came on for Daniel Hernandez at halftime. One week later he made his first start in Dallas and was a fixture in Steve Nicol's starting lineup from that point on, missing just one game. Finished the season with two goals and two assists for six points and his strong partnership with José Cancela in central midfield helped spur the Revs to a 6-0-1 record over the final two months of the regular season. Played briefly in goal against Chicago on July 19. Recorded his firstcareer MLS point (an assist) on May 17 in a 3-0 victory over Chicago at home, then scored his first career MLS goal on Sept. 28 against Columbus in a 3-2, overtime victory at home.ing the 2002 season. 



Leonard gives the coaching staff an option at both left back and left-sided midfielder with his workrate, quickness and man-marking acumen ... now in his fifth full season with the Revs, Leonard continues to improve his skill on the ball and serves a good cross into the box from the left flank.

2006: Made one appearance before missing the rest of the season after suffering a ruptured left Achilles tendon on April 24 in a scrimmage against Boston College at Gillette Stadium. Underwent reconstructive surgery that evening and spent the rest of the season rehabilitating after being placed on MLS' season-ending injury list on May 24. Resumed full-team training during the MLS Cup Playoffs.

2005: Was a regular starter for the Revolution on the left side of the midfield. Started 25 of the 27 games in which he appeared during the regular season, and appeared in two games - starting both - in the MLS Cup Playoffs. Scored his first MLS career goal in the 31st minute on April 23 at D.C. United. Added an assist on Clint Dempsey's game-winning goal against Chivas USA on April 30.

2004: More than doubled his number of appearances in 2003 (10), appearing in 25 regular-season games and three postseason matches. Saw time at midfield and in the defense. Registered his first MLS career point with an assist on Taylor Twellman's goal against Dallas on Oct. 2. Played one of his best games in a Revs uniform in the Eastern Conference Championship match at D.C. Assisted Twellman on the first New England goal in that match with a pinpoint cross from the left wing.

2003: Composed, athletic and hard-working, Leonard made the Revolution roster a year after being drafted by the Revs. Appeared in 10 games in his first full MLS season, starting five games mostly as an outside back. By mid-season, he found himself filling in during big games at left back. Made his first-career MLS start on Aug. 30 against Chicago in a 5-1 New England victory. 

Noonan can attack from either wing, using both feet to good effect ... has a knack for good link-up play and making players around him better ... holds the ball exceptionally well and has good tactical awareness ...combines well with childhood friend and Revs strike partner Taylor Twellman ... always a scoring threat when he's on the field.

2006: Missed significant portions of the season with various injuries (hamstring, back, hip flexor, sports hernia), which limited to action in only 14 games and a career-low 851 minutes. Netted one goal and three assists in his appearances. Continued his mastery against New York, netting his 11th goal against the club in 14 regular-season games on Sept. 9, which proved to also be the game-winning goal in the 1-0 victory. Returned from sports hernia surgery (Oct. 9) against Chicago on Oct. 28 in Game Two of the Eastern Conference Semifinal Series at Gillette Stadium, entering as a halftime substitute and scoring the series-tying goal that brought New England level, 2-2, on aggregate, before later converting his attempt in the series-deciding penalty kicks, which the Revs won to advance to their fifth consecutive Eastern Conference Championship. Assisted on Taylor Twellman's fourth-minute game-winning goal in the Revs' 1-0 victory at D.C. on Nov. 5, sending the team to its second consecutive MLS Cup. Also started MLS Cup 2006, playing all 120 minutes.

2005: Noonan's third MLS season saw him hit great highs while enduring some frustrating spells. Noonan scored eight goals through June 25 but did not tally in the league again until the playoffs, largely because of absences due to U.S. National Team duty and injuries. Named an MLS All-Star for the league's game against EPL side Fulham FC, but was unable to play because of injury. Was the Honda MLS Player of the Week for Week 13 after scoring two goals against

Columbus on June 22 and adding his third strike of the week on June 25 against the MetroStars. Registered assists in four consecutive matches between Sept. 10-24, tying him for the second longest such streak in 2005. Noonan's go-ahead goal against the MetroStars in Game Two of the Eastern Conference Semifinals at Gillette Stadium brought the Revs level at 2-2 on aggregate and was a major component of New England's stunning comeback in that series.

2004: Noonan shared the 2004 MLS Budweiser Scoring Championship with MetroStars midfielder Amado Guevara, recording 11 goals and 8 assists for a league-leading 30 points. Posted second career hat trick in Revs' win at Kansas City on June 2. Scored game-tying goal in the Eastern Conference Championship game against D.C. on Nov. 6

2003: Injuries to key players provided Noonan the opportunity to start at striker down the stretch of the 2003 season and he went on to exceed the expectations of most pundits around the league, scoring 10 goals and adding two more in the playoffs. He started the season as an understudy to the wide midfielders and ended the season as a forward, finishing in the top 10 in MLS in goals (10) and in points (27). Was particularly effective against the MetroStars, scoring seven of his 10 regular-season goals and both of his playoff goals against the Tri-State area club. ... Soccer America named Parkhurs the top-ranked central defender in a three-man back line in MLS during 2006.

2006: Anchored MLS' best defense that allowed just 35 goals in 32 games for a club record 1.09 goals against average. Honored as MLS' U.S. Soccer Foundation Humanitarian of the Year for his exemplary community involvement. After missing the first two games of the season, played every minute of the remaining 30 regular-season games and all four postseason contests. Was voted to Soccer America's 2006 MLS Cup Playoffs Best XI as the Revs had a team GAA of 0.64 in their four-game run.

2005: Won MLS Gatorade Rookie of the Year award. Parkhurst played every minute of every Revolution MLS regular-season game (2880) in 2005, making him one of only five MLS players to do so that year. Committed just six fouls in the course of the entire regular season.

Ralston possesses great technique, tactical knowledge and determination ... Soccer America named Ralston the second-best right middfelder in MLS for the 2006 season ... he has also filled in capably as a leftsided middfelder and right fullback during his five seasons with the Revolution ... the MLS "Iron Man," Ralston holds two of the league's longevity records - minutes played (27,548) and career starts (309) - and is second in career appearances (311) entering the 2007 season, a record which he's poised to claim in 2007 ... also enters 2007 ranked third in MLS career assists (107), behind former Tampa Bay Mutiny teammate Carlos Valderama (114, career leader) and Preki (111). He also holds the Revolution club record for career assists (45) and gamewinning assists (12).

2006: Netted six goals and added five assists on the season, marking his ninth professional season with five or more goals. Ralston collected all five of his assists in the final 12 games of the regular season, in which the Revs went 6-2-4. Tied for the MLS lead in game-winning assists (4). Scored the game-tying goal in the final minute of stoppage time in the Revs' 1-1 draw at Kansas City on July 29. His go-ahead, turn-around goal at Chicago on July 8 was an at-large nomination for MLS Sierra Mist Goal of the Year. Set up Pat Noonan for the game-winning goal against the Red Bulls on Sept. 9 at Cillette Stadium. Assisted on Khano Smith's 88th-minute game-winning goal against Columbus on Oct. 14 to help the Revs clinch second place in the Eastern Conference. Spent much time during preseason training and early season matches shuttling between the Revolution and U.S. Men's National Team camps and friendlies

2005: With his start at Columbus on Sept. 21, Ralston made his 100th appearance in a Revolution uniform, his first having come on March 23, 2002 against the MetroStars. He finished the season with 103 starts, enough for fourth all-time in that category for the Revs. His assist on Taylor Twellman's sixth-minute goal at the MetroStars on May 21 gave him the Revolution record 36th career assist to surpass Joe-Max Moore (35) as he finished the season with 40 career assists. With his assist on Twellman's 39th-minute game-winner against the Crew on Sept. 10, Ralston claimed the Revolution record for game-winning assists with eight, passing Mike Burns (seven GWG in 108 games) and José Cancela (seven GWA in 61 games).

2004: Ralston's versatility proved to be a huge asset to New England as Ralston filled-in at right fullback, left midfield and central midfield due to the Revs' injury problems. The Revolution's team MVP, tied for third on the team in goals (7) and tied for second on the team in assists (8). Only member of the team to play every minute of all 30 games in 2004. Was an MLS All-Star selection, his fourth such honor. Started all three of the Revs' playoff contests, scoring one goal and adding two assists. Assisted on Avery John's game-winning goal against Columbus in Game One of the Eastern Conference Semifinals, then converted a penalty kick and assisted on Pat Noonan's 85th-minute, game-tying goal against D.C. in the Eastern Conference Final.

2003: Though away on U.S. National Team duty for the middle portion of the MLS season, still put up strong numbers for the Revolution. Started 25 of the 26 games in which he played. Did not start the Revs' July 27

Considered by many to be the top goalkeeper in the league, Reis brings an unmatched presence and intelligence to the position ... sound positionally, brave in traffic and excellent with the ball at his feet, Reis is also an strong organizer and communicator ... a fantastic shot-stopper on penalty kicks, and one of head coach Steve Nicol's first selections to take penalty kicks ... holds every New England career goalkeeping record, including games played in goal (92), games started in goal (91), minutes played in goal (8,237), goals against average (1.22), wins (36), saves (365), shutots (23) and saves percentage (.729) ... Soccer America named Reis the top goalkeeper in MLS for the 2006 season.

2006: Established himself as arguably MLS' top goalkeeper as he was voted 2006 Revolution Honda MVP. Backed the league's best defense, which allowed just 35 goals in 32 games for a team-record 1.09 goals against average. Led MLS in shutouts (10) and his 141 saves outpaced the next closest goalkeeper by 33, matching and setting New England records, respectively. One of two players in MLS to play every minute of every game, tying the MLS and Revolution records and setting new personal single-season marks in both categories. 



Twellman followed up another productive regular season in 2006 with a massive postseason, scoring in three consecutive MLS Cup Playoffs matches, including the MLS Cup final ... Twellman remains the league's premier penalty-area predator, combining a diverse arsenal of scoring abilities with fierce determination in front of the goal ... "Mr. New England Soccer" since his arrival in Foxborough in 2002, Twellman is the mainstay of the Revs' attack ... became the youngest player in MLS history to score 75 goals (26 yrs., 221 days) with his game-winning goal at D.C. on Oct. 7, surpassing Jason Kreis (29 yrs., 168 days) for the record.

2006: Led the Revs in goal scoring for the fourth time in his fiveyear career, netting a team-best 11 goals. Scored his 75th career goal at D.C. on Oct. 7, a goal that was also the game-winning goal in the Revs' 2-1 victory at RFK Stadium. Was one of six MLS players to start all 32 games, and ranked fourth in MLS in minutes played 2,856, setting a new personal single-season best. Was second in MLS in shots (86) and shots on goal (42), while ranking ninth in fouls suffered (60). An MLS All-Star selection, although he was unable to play in the game because of the Revs' rescheduled game at Chivas USA. Twice scored goals in three straight games during the regular season (April 30 vs. Chicago through May 13 vs. Chivas USA and again June 28 vs. Dallas through July 4 at Colorado), and then again in the playoffs. Notched a goal against Chicago in Game Two of the Eastern Conference Semifinal Series to pull the Revs within one goal on aggregate, and after Pat Noonan knotted the series on aggregate later to send the series to a decisive penalty-kick round, Twellman scored the series-clinching penalty kick in the fourth round. Scored a highlight-reel goal - also the game-winning goal - at D.C. in the Eastern Conference Championship to send the Revs to MLS Cup 2006. Netted a goal in the 113th minute against Houston in MLS Cup 2006 - the Revs' first-ever goal in the league's championship game - and later

scored in the penalty-kick round. After scoring goals in the Revs' final three playoff games, Twellman was named to Soccer America's 2006 MLS Cup Playoffs Best XI. Spent much of preseason training and the early season going back and forth between the Revolution and U.S. National Team camps and friendlies.

2005: Voted MLS Honda MVP and won MLS' Budweiser Golden Boot, while making his second appearance on the end-of-season MLS RadioShack Best XI. An MLS All-Star for the third time in his career, and earned All-Star Game MVP honors after scoring one goal against EPL side Fulham FC. Scored two hat tricks in 2005 against Dallas on July 16 and against Columbus on Sept. 10 - setting the club record for career three-goal games (3). On April 27 at Soldier Field against the Chicago Fire, Twellman scored his 50th career regular-season goal in a Revolution uniform, making him the first Revs player to reach that milestone. Led MLS in shots on goal (51). Went eight consecutive games with a goal and/or an assist between Aug. 6 and Sept. 24, the longest such streak in MLS in 2005. Earned MLS Player of the Month honors for September, scoring five goals and adding one assist in four games played. Was second in MLS in game-winning goals with six. Was voted the Midnight Riders' Man of the Year, becoming the first player to win the award three times

2004: Fought through injuries to appear in 23 games. Emerged from a scoring slump early in the season to finish second on the Revs in goals with nine. Added two vital goals for the Revs in the playoffs: one goal against Columbus in Game Two of the Eastern Conference Semifinals and the first of the Revs' three game-tying goals against D.C. in the Eastern Conference Final. Led MLS in shots on goal (39).

2003: Led MLS in points per game (1.55) and goals per game (0.68) and tied Carlos Ruiz atop the goal-scoring chart with 15 goals. Tied for third in MLS in points (34). Voted Revolution Team MVP. Missed games because of sinusitis, walking pneumonia and multiple broken bones in his face. His season came to an end when he broke his left foot at Dallas on Oct. 4, a game in which he scored two goals. Missed all of the 2003 MLS Cup Playoffs with the broken foot. Was voted the Midnight Riders' Man of the Year, becoming the first player to win the in back-to-back seasons.

2002: Runner-up for league MVP and was a RadioShack Best XI selection. The first MLS scoring champion in Revs history, tallying 52 points on 23 goals and six assists. Was voted the Revolution Most Valuable Player as he helped lead the Revs to their first-ever MLS Cup appearance, a 1-0, overtime loss to Los Angeles at Gillette Stadium. Had five multiple-goal games, and netted five game-winning goals. Was awarded the Nickelodeon GAS Play of the Year for his bicycle kick goal against the Kansas City Wizards on June 22. Started all six of the Revs' MLS Cup Playoffs games in which he appeared. Had two tallies in the playoffs, and was second on the team in postseason points to Brian Kamler (six). Both of his goals came against Chicago in the Eastern Conference Semifinals (Game One and Game Three). Was voted the Midnight Riders' Man of the Year.

BEFORE MLS: Played two seasons with TSV 1860 Munich in Germany ... in 2001, he declined a two-year option with the club and entered the 2002 MLS SuperDraft ... appeared in more than 40 games for the club's reserve side, including qualifying games for the German Cup.

COLLEGE: Played two seasons at Maryland (1998-99) before signing a professional contract in Germany ... scored 28 career goals and added 17 assists for 73 career points in 43 games with the Terrapins ... left the Maryland program ranked 10th in career goals, sixth in career assists and seventh in career points after only two seasons ... was Soccer America's National Freshman of the

Year in 1998 after earning a spot on the publication's All-Freshman Team ... was an NSCAA All-American as a sophomore, and was a two-time NSCAA All-South Atlantic and two-time All-ACC performer.

U.S. NATIONAL TEAM: Has earned 19 caps and scored five goals for the U.S. National Team as of March 1, 2007... an alternate selection to the U.S.'s 2006 FIFA World Cup squad ... tied with former Revs teammate Clint Dempsey as the USMNT's leading goal scorer in 2006 ... scored a hat trick in the USMNT's 5-0 win over Norway on Jan. 29, 2006 at The Home Depot Center in Carson, Calif., the ninth hat trick all-time for the U.S. ... was named ESPN2's Man of the Match after scoring the game-winning goal and providing two assists in a 3-2 U.S. National Team victory over Japan on Feb. 10, 2006 at SBC Park in San Francisco ... scored his first international goal on Oct. 12, 2005 at Gillette Stadium in the U.S.'s 2-0 victory over Panama in its final match of the qualifying cycle for the 2006 FIFA World Cup ... is a former member of the Under-20 program, and won the Bronze Boot at the 1999 FIFA World Youth Championship.

QUICK KICKS: Married to wife Lindsay ... his brother James was drafted by the San Jose Earthquakes in the fourth round (42nd overall) of the 2005 MLS SuperDraft ... his sister Alex was a standout soccer player for St. Louis University ... his father, Tim Twellman, played professionally for the Minnesota Kicks, Tulsa Roughnecks and the Chicago Sting (NASL) ... his uncle, Steve Twellman, also played in NASL, including the 1974 season with the Boston Minutemen, while another uncle, Mike, played for the NASL Chicago Sting ... his grandfather Jim Delsing played 10 seasons of Major League Baseball (and 17 season of professional baseball overall), and his uncle Jay Delsing is a member of the PGA Tour ... Twellman was offered a professional baseball contract by the Kansas City Royals but opted for a soccer career instead ... his favorite actors are Morgan Freeman and Kiefer Sutherland ... his favorite soccer memory is playing high school soccer and baseball with his brother ... attended Maryland on a baseball scholarship.

A pure shot-stopper, Warren employs cat-quick reflexes and experience to produce highlight-reel caliber saves ... provides a very capable backup option to Matt Reis ... displays a tireless mentality whether competing for the first team or the reserves ... Warren played collegiate soccer at Clemson and Indiana ... began his MLS career with D.C. United in 2003 and 2004 ... was a longtime member of the U.S. youth international programs.

2006: Did not see any first team action, but was the Revolution reserve squad's starting keeper. Started eight games for the reserves, posting one shutout - a 0-0 draw against Chivas USA on May 14 - while combining with T.J. Tomasso for a 0-0 draw against the Chicago Fire Reserves on Aug. 21. Made a season-high 13 saves against the Kansas City Reserves on Sept. 23.

2005: Traded to the Revolution from D.C. on Jan. 20 in exchange for the Revs' natural fourth-round selection in the 2006 MLS SuperDraft. He backed up Reis for the remainder of the season without making any appearances for the Revs

2003: Drafted by D.C. in the second round (14th overall) in the 2003 MLS SuperDraft. Warren appeared in six games for D.C., starting five of those. 
