YOUTH TEAM OVERVIEW

In April 2008, the New England Revolution announced the formation of its fully-funded youth development program. Now in its second year, the Revs field Under-16 and Under-18 teams, which play in the prestigious U.S. Soccer Development Academy.

The U.S. Soccer Development Academy includes the top youth programs from around the country, as well as 10 other MLS clubs' youth development teams.

In an effort to afford the region's players the opportunity to train and compete at an elite level, the Revolution's youth development program is fully-funded by the club. Qualified and talented players are accepted on the teams without regard to their financial situation. All player needs and expenses related to soccer activities - training, facilities, equipment, uniforms, travel associated with competitions - are provided by the Revolution.



KARL EDMONDS

DIRECTOR OF YOUTH DEVELOPMENT // HEAD COACH UNDER-18s

Karl Edmonds is one of the most established coaches and talent evaluators in New England youth soccer, having spent 12 years as the Director of Soccer and Player Development for Seacoast United Soccer Club, a perennial power on both the regional and national scenes based in Hampton, N.H. He was hired as the Revolution's Director of Youth Development in August of 2009.

Edmonds oversees the youth development program, working closely with the Revolution's technical staff to create and implement the youth teams' coaching curriculum and training systems. He is also the head coach of the Revs' Under-18 squad.

Edmonds joined the Revolution after a decorated 12-year stint with Seacoast United, where his clubs won a staggering 65 state championships, more than 10 USL regional championships and one national championship. During his time with Seacoast from 1998-2009, Edmonds coached more than 10,000 players ranging in age from 6-20 and helped hundreds of players move on to successful college soccer careers. He was named the 2007 New Hampshire State Coach of the Year.

The Revolution's technical staff, under the direction of Vice President of Player Personnel Michael Burns, oversees all instruction and development of the teams' players. Karl Edmonds, the Revs' Director of Youth Development, runs the program with the assistance of his staff.

Under Major League's Soccer's "Homegrown Protected List," the Revolution is able to protect up to three players per year who have played with the club's youth teams. Should those protected players sign with MLS, they would not go through the MLS SuperDraft but would be placed directly on the New England Revolution roster. Through the structure of MLS' youth development program, players' amateur status is preserved and they do not jeopardize their collegiate eligibility by playing for the Revs' youth teams.

In addition to his success on the field, Edmonds was also heavily involved in several successful ventures off the field for Seacoast United, including the creation of a \$6 million outdoor field complex which houses four turf fields.

After earning his bachelor's degree in Business Administration and Sports Management from Southern New Hampshire University (formerly New Hampshire College) in 1993, he remained at the school to obtain his master's degree in International Business in 1996.

An apprentice with the famed Liverpool Football Club from 1984-1987, Edmonds was an All American and two-year captain during his college career at Division II New Hampshire College (1989-1993). A native of Liverpool, England, Edmonds spent two years in the United Soccer Leagues with the Boston Storm (1995) and New Hampshire Phantoms (1996) while serving as an assistant coach with his alma mater's women's team.

Edmonds lives in southern New Hampshire with his wife, Maureen, and their three children, Lilly, Evan and Elizabeth.



DEVEN APAJEE

REVOLUTION ACADEMY DIRECTOR // ASSISTANT COACH UNDER-18s

Deven Apajee is currently in his fifth year with the Revolution, serving in a variety of roles with the club's various youth programs. In addition to being the Director of Player Development Programs for the Revolution Academy, Apajee is also the Program Coordinator for the Youth Development Program and the primary assistant coach for the Revolution Under-18 team under Director of Youth Development, Karl Edmonds. Additionally, Apajee handles all administrative matters for both the Under-16 and Under-18 teams.

During his tenure at the helm of the Revolution's commercial youth development program, the Revolution Academy has expanded into a year-round training and development program in communities from Maine to Rhode Island.

An experienced youth coach and player development professional, Apajee began his coaching experience with Leyton Orient FC in England as the club's Football Development Officer. After coming to the United States, he worked with MLS Camps and then served as the Director of Youth Development for the Chicago Fire. At the youth level, Apajee is the Director of Coach Education & Player Development for Super Liga, Rhode Island's youth club league, and he currently coaches at the Premier club level.

Apajee possesses an engaging style that commands young players' attention. A native of London, England, Apajee holds USSF "B" and UEFA "B" coaching licenses.

He resides in Cranston, Rhode Island with his wife, Dawn, and their two children.





BRYAN SCALES

HEAD COACH UNDER-16s

Bryan Scales enters his first season as the head coach of the New England Revolution's Under-16 team, while continuing to fulfill his duties as head coach of the University of Massachusetts Lowell men's soccer team. He also serves as a scout for the U.S. Men's National Team in the U.S. Development Academy and an assistant coach with the Under-15 boy's national team.

Scales' previous work experience includes an 11-year stint as the head coach of the men's soccer team at Cornell University (1998-2009), where he ranks fourth on the all-time wins list with 61 career victories.

He was named the NSCAA Division I Coach of the Year for the New York region in 2001, while he was also a finalist for national coach of the year that same season.

A 1991 graduate of Hartwick College, Scales received his NSCAA International Premier Diploma in 2007 in Curitiba, Brazil.

Prior to his time at Cornell, Scales held positions as an assistant coach with both the U.S. Olympic Development Program Region I Team and Harvard University's men's soccer team.



JOHN FREDERICK

ASSISTANT COACH UNDER-16s

John Frederick enters his second season as an assistant coach for the New England Revolution's Youth Development Program after most recently working as an assistant coach with the Massachusetts Olympic Development Program Under-17 team.

Currently an assistant coach for the men's soccer team at the College of the Holy Cross, Frederick holds his USSF "B" coaching license. He also received his NSCAA Premier Diploma from the Lilleshall National Sports Centre in England in 2004.

Frederick's previous work experience includes serving as the head coach for both the Algonquin Regional High School and Marlborough High School's boys' varsity soccer teams and coaching stints with the Tri-Valley Eagles and FC Puma.



KARL SPRATT

GOALKEEPERS COACH

Karl Spratt enters his first season as the goalkeepers coach for the New England Revolution's Youth Development Program after joining the club in November 2009.

Spratt's previous work experience includes coaching stints with a variety of English club academy programs, including Sunderland AFC – currently of the Barclays Premier League – and Darlington FC. He also spent time as the head goalkeepers coach with various universities in the Northeast of England.

A graduate of the University of Sunderland, Spratt holds a bachelor's degree in sport and exercise development and his FA goalkeeping license.

A native of Newcastle, England, Spratt spent time as a player with Manchester United's youth academy, while he was also part of an England National Team developmental squad at the U-18 level.



U.S. SOCCER DEVELOPMENT ACADEMY

DEVELOPING THE NEXT GENERATION

U.S. Soccer's Development Academy program is driven by the game and its players, coaches and referees. This game-centric approach allows for long-term development to occur through a deep understanding of what makes players successful around the world. As the sport of soccer grows in the United States, young players in our country need the proper environment to compete against the world's elite.

The U.S. Soccer Development Academy program provides the optimum developmental environment for the nation's top youth soccer players, coaches and referees by emphasizing development through quality training and limited, meaningful competition.

MEANINGFUL TRAINING

Academy teams spend a greater amount of time focused on training to improve as individuals and as a team. The teams and players receive direct feedback and evaluations from National Team Staff and ProZone video analysis. To round-out the complete training environment, Academy teams are tested in their physical capabilities using the SPARQ testing methodology and their hydration levels by Gatorade. They also receive a SPARQ training curriculum for soccer-specific athletic training and Nutrition and Hydration recommendations from Gatorade's Sports Science Institute. Each athlete then gains a greater understanding of how they compare physically against their peers and what they need to do to achieve their optimal performance levels.



COMPETITIVE ENVIRONMENT

The Academy program features teams from the top youth clubs (including those from Major League Soccer) from around the country. Each Academy team plays approximately 30 regular-season games to ensure all games are meaningful. Games are also played according to FIFA's Laws of the Game and officiated by a pool of the nation's top young referees in order to prepare players for the next level of competition. National Team Scouts regularly attend Academy games, so players are evaluated over the course of the season and in their natural positions allowing for better player assessment.

EARLY SUCCESS

As the program enters its second year, it has already dramatically impacted the player development process in the United States. In 2008, more than 100 players from Academy clubs were included in U.S. Youth National Teams and almost 800 graduates from the inaugural Academy class participated in college soccer the following fall. Virtually all college programs use the Academy program as a scouting vehicle and the program has received increased attention from professional scouts representing domestic and international clubs.
